taking on the role as Family Service Coordinator at our Ellenville School. During her time in Ellenville, she has further developed her skills, increasingly taking on additional leadership roles and responsibilities, leading to her current role as Ellenville's Program Coordinator.

Elizabeth earned an advanced certificate in Educational Leadership at SUNY New Paltz, and is a Ruby Rose Award recipient, a peer-driven honor bestowed to a staff member who exemplifies the values of Spectrum Services. Elizabeth believes the greatest growth for students comes when families and schools have a collaborative working relationship, and she takes great pride in the countless positive outcomes of students and families with whom she's worked.

## Meet the Student



Meet Roy Nugent, affectionately called Junior by family, friends, and our staff. When Junior started as a preschooler in our Red Class, he was dealing with difficulties that roughened the diamond we knew lay within him. He presented with communication challenges, social skills difficulties, and other issues that caused him much frustration, which manifested itself in a number of behavioral concerns.

Our Red Class staff, speech pathologists, and occupational therapists were able to help Junior by alleviating some of the frustrations he was experiencing. Although he had a lot of work ahead of him, this progress certainly put him on a track for success, and prepared him for his aging-up move to our Bronze Class.

"It was evident Junior needed a lot of structure, and his mind was just working so fast, oftentimes too fast, and we needed to slow that down," says Heather Gulnick, our Bronze Class special educator. "This little boy showed great potential, and had such a sharp sense of humor, but his mind and body raced too fast and out of control for him to absorb all that his environment had to offer," Gulnick

Slowly and steadily, the time spent with Bronze Class's caring and attentive staff greatly improved Junior's ability to focus, while at the same time teaching him how to better balance his behavior. It was about this time we started seeing faint glimmers from Junior's diamond in the rough.

Junior moved up to our Silver Class this past Summer Program, where Special Educator Marissa Proper says he transitioned well. "He just has this awesome sense of humor, and wants to be helpful, and to be a big boy, and part of that is being independent, and so we've been giving him space to grow, do things on his own, and expanding his self-determination."

Selecting Junior as our student highlight was an easy choice, and all our staff who've worked with him agreed he certainly is one of our Spectrum Services success stories.

#### It's as easy as A, B, and C

A) First, log into your Facebook page, find on the upper right of your page the white, downward arrow that clicks your pages drop-down box. In that, you'll see "Create Fundraiser," and click on that to bring up the Create a Fundraiser pop-up box, and then click "Get Started."

B) On the next box, you'll be given options on who you're raising funds for, from which you'll click the middle option for Nonprofit, which opens a box allowing you to select which nonprofit. In the textbox up top, type "Center for Spectrum Services," which should display the Spectrum Services fundraising option. Click that, and follow the rest of the set up instructions for your goal and duration of your fundraiser.

C) That opens the "Tell your story" box, where you can tell your friends you're raising funds to help support Spectrum Services, a school for children on the autism spectrum. Then, simply click "Create" to start your fundraising.

#### **What Next?**

Then, share with all your Facebook friends on your page, or if you know friends who might be more responsive to a Facebook message, you can send it to them that way, too.
